Basis: Pursuant to the statutory authority set forth by § 9-170(8) of the Code of Virginia, the Criminal Justice Services Board (CJSB) will amend and revise its regulations relating to entry-level dispatcher training.

Purpose: The purpose of the proposed amendments is to incorporate changes identified through the 1999 statewide job task analysis and to provide a method for reviewing training objectives on an on-going basis with updates handled in a more systematic and expeditious manner. These regulations set forth training mandates and prescribe compulsory minimum training standards. These standards must be met by successful achievement of each training objective related to a task that must be performed as a requirement of the position by every newly employed dispatcher attending entry-level dispatcher training. Successful achievement of all training objectives is the standard that assures minimum competency in the performance of dispatcher duties throughout the Commonwealth. The safety and welfare of the public is paramount in setting forth these requirements while providing protection from incompetent or unqualified persons from performing dispatcher duties.

Substance: The substance of these regulations is in 6 VAC 20-60-20 and is three-fold. First, the standard requires satisfactory completion of the performance outcomes and training hours approved by the Criminal Justice Services Board for entry-level dispatcher training. Second, the standard requires satisfactory completion of all field (or on-the-job) training objectives. Additionally, in 6 VAC 20-60-40, dispatchers are required to meet the training standards within 12 months of employment as a dispatcher. Extensions may be given in certain circumstances. Finally, provisions are set

forth in the rules that establish minimum requirements for training providers.

Issues: The advantages these regulations provide to the public are as follows: assurance of a minimum level of competency required by all dispatchers throughout the Commonwealth; involvement of the Committee on Training, the legislatively established body representing every aspect of the criminal justice system and criminal justice services, as the approving authority for revisions or updates to the training objectives to provide guidance for the delivery of entry-level dispatcher training; and delivery of training through a certified training academy. The Criminal Justice Services Board remains the adopting authority for revisions to the rules.

The recognition that training for minimum levels of competency needs to increase as the requirements of law, technology, and citizen involvement change does have a financial impact for the delivery of this training. Recognizing that there is some level of economic impact on raising minimum training standards for dispatchers, it is noted that the funding mechanism to support this is already in place. The sufficiency of the level of funding and distribution of funding will be an issue for local jurisdictions to address.

There are no disadvantages to the agency with the revision of the minimum training standards. The agency is simply supporting the Criminal Justice Services Board in its responsibility set by the Code of Virginia to set minimum training standards for dispatchers. The disadvantage to the public occurs when minimum training standards are not updated periodically to ensure minimum competency levels. By conducting a job task analysis and developing standards that clearly connect the work of the job with the training needed to perform that work, the public receives assurance of minimum competency levels.

Economic Impact: Under the current training delivery system, it is difficult to ascertain the level of fiscal impact the proposed changes will have. The cost of training at the various academies differs due to use of a decentralized system for delivery of training in the Commonwealth. While an increase in minimum training hours is proposed, it is divided between academy training and on-the-job training. The differences in equipment and technology used by varying jurisdictions require this. The rules establish the objectives that must be achieved during training and the criteria that must be met in order to demonstrate that achievement. However, the net economic impact of this increase will not be known until the academies have had time to compare the proposed training objectives to what is currently taught at the respective academies.

The estimated number of persons affected annually by the Regulations Relating to Entry-Level Dispatcher Training on a direct basis is approximately 500 individuals attending training and approximately 50 staff for the delivery of training. The

results of the training, however, impact every person in the Commonwealth in terms of public safety, health, and welfare.

Department of Planning and Budget's Economic Impact Analysis: The Department of Planning and Budget (DPB) has analyzed the economic impact of this proposed regulation in accordance with § 9-6.14:7.1 G of the Administrative Process Act and Executive Order Number 25 (98). Section 9-6.14:7.1 G requires that such economic impact analyses include, but need not be limited to, the projected number of businesses or other entities to whom the regulation would apply, the identity of any localities and types of businesses or other entities particularly affected, the projected number of persons and employment positions to be affected, the projected costs to affected businesses or entities to implement or comply with the regulation, and the impact on the use and value of private property. The analysis presented below represents DPB's best estimate of these economic impacts.

Summary of the proposed regulation. The Department of Criminal Justice Services (department) proposes to eliminate specified minimum number of hours of training and lists within the regulations that specify general areas to be addressed in classroom and on-the-job training. Instead the regulations would require that dispatchers demonstrate specific performance outcomes while at a certified training academy and on the job.

Estimated economic impact. The current regulations require a minimum of 40 hours of classroom training and 40 hours of on-the-job training for law-enforcement dispatchers. The regulations also list general areas to be addressed in classroom and on-the-job training. The department proposes to eliminate minimum hours of training and the lists of general areas to be addressed. Instead the regulations would require specific performance outcomes for dispatchers while at a certified training academy and on the job. According to the department, training for all of the required performance outcomes will require approximately 80 hours of classroom training and 80 hours of on-the-job training. The regulations do leave open the option for academies to let individuals who already possess some of the required skills to test out of training for those particular skills.¹ Thus, the amount of required training time could be substantially less than 80 hours of classroom training and 80 hours of on-the-job training for some dispatchers. The department conducted a survey of the training academies and found that all 17 respondents currently conduct at least 80 hours of on-the-job training, and that 12 out of 17 currently conduct at least 80 hours of classroom training.

In order to determine which tasks dispatchers should be required to demonstrate competency in, the department compiled an extensive list of potential tasks and surveyed entry-level dispatchers and their supervisors about those tasks. The following decision rules were used:²

1. Frequency: If 50% or more of the entry-level dispatcher respondents said they performed a task daily, weekly,

several times weekly, or monthly, the task was included as part of the training task list.

2. Criticality: If

- a. Less than 50% of the entry-level dispatcher respondents said they performed the task once or more in the past year, but
- b. At least 50% of the supervisory respondents indicated that inadequate performance of the task would, at minimum, produce serious consequences, the task was included as part of the training task list.

Thus, if a task would typically not be included in training on the basis of frequency as indicated by entry-level dispatchers, the task may still be included in training on the basis of criticality as indicated by supervisors. For example, the task of dispatching public safety personnel to respond to jail or prison escape did not meet the criteria for inclusion on the basis of frequency. However, supervisors indicated that this was a critical task. Therefore, it is included as a required competency.

Based on the information provided by the academies on number of hours currently utilized for entry-level dispatcher training, it appears that the majority of academies are already spending a sufficient number of hours on training. Since the proposed required competencies may require some training that is not currently conducted, some expense for equipment and the training of instructors may be required for even those academies that are currently conducting a sufficient number of hours on training. The department has not collected any information concerning costs to localities. However, the department's combination of surveys and decision rules do appear to be a sound method of choosing the most important tasks to require. Having better-trained dispatchers can clearly be beneficial. For example, better-trained dispatchers may be less likely to make mistakes when handling emergency calls from the public. There is insufficient data, though, to accurately estimate those benefits. Due to the insufficient information concerning benefits of the increased training requirements and the absence of cost data, it is not possible to conclusively determine whether the proposed amendments to the regulations create net economic benefit. But the use of the survey to determine the most important tasks to require competency in will likely cause the time in training to be spent more efficiently on the most important tasks. That aspect of the proposed amendments is clearly beneficial. What is less clear is whether the benefits of the least important of the specified competencies outweigh its undetermined associated costs.

Businesses and entities affected. The proposed revised regulations potentially affect the 10 regional and 17 independent academies that train dispatchers in Virginia, approximately 50 instructors who provide the training and approximately 500 individuals who attend training each year.³

Localities particularly affected. The proposed regulatory changes affect all Virginia localities.

Proposed Regulations

Projected impact on employment. Since the majority of academies already spend a sufficient number of hours on training, the proposed regulatory change would most likely not significantly increase the number of hours that localities must employ instructors of dispatchers.

Effects on the use and value of private property. The proposed regulatory changes may result in better-trained dispatchers. To the extent that better-trained dispatchers are less likely to make mistakes and may more quickly properly handle incoming calls, damage or loss to private property may be averted. For example, a better trained dispatcher may make it more likely that thieves are caught (through faster dispatching of law enforcement) and stolen property is recovered.

Agency's Response to the Department of Planning and Budget's Economic Impact Analysis: The Department of Criminal Justice Services agrees with the impact analysis. It agrees both with the analysis of the benefits to the public and industry as well as the increased costs.

Summary:

The proposed amendments replace the specified minimum number of hours of training and the lists that specify general areas to be addressed in classroom and on-the-job training with requirements that dispatchers demonstrate specific performance outcomes while at a certified training academy and on the job.

6 VAC 20-60-10. Definitions.

The following words and terms, when used in this chapter shall have the following meaning meanings, unless the context clearly indicates otherwise:

"Academy director" means the chief administrative officer of a certified training academy.

"Agency administrator" means any chief of police, sheriff, or agency head of a state or local law-enforcement agency or person in charge of a communications center.

"Board" means the Criminal Justice Services Board.

"Certified training academy" means a training school which provides instruction of at least the minimum training standards mandated by the board and has been approved by the department for the specific purpose of training criminal justice personnel facility in compliance with academy certification standards operated by the state or local unit(s) of government for the purpose of providing instruction of compulsory minimum training standards.

"Compulsory minimum training standards" means the performance outcomes and minimum hours approved by the Criminal Justice Services Board.

"Curriculum Review Committee" means the committee consisting of the following 13 individuals: four members of the committee shall represent regional criminal justice academies, four members of the committee shall represent independent criminal justice academies, one member shall represent the Department of State Police Training Academy, and four experienced communications personnel shall represent emergency communication functions. The

Committee on Training shall appoint members of the Curriculum Review Committee.

"Department" means the Department of Criminal Justice Services.

"Director" means the chief administrative officer of the department.

"Dispatcher" means any person employed by or in any local or state government agency either full or part-time whose duties include the dispatching of law-enforcement personnel.

"Emergency medical dispatcher training" means training which meets or exceeds the training objectives in the document entitled "Performance Based Training and Testing Objectives for Compulsory Minimum Training Standards for Dispatchers," as provided in Performance Outcome 1.7, which is set out in 6 VAC 20-60-100.

"VCIN/NCIC training" means approved training as specified by the Virginia Department of State Police for dispatchers accessing Virginia Crime Information Network/National Crime Information Center information.

6 VAC 20-60-20. Compulsory minimum training standards.

6 VAC 20-60-25. Approval authority.

A. The Criminal Justice Services Board shall be the approval authority for the training categories and performance outcomes of the compulsory minimum training standards. Amendments to training categories and performance outcomes shall be made in accordance with the provisions of the Administrative Process Act (§ 2.2-4000 et seq. of the Code of Virginia).

B. The Committee on Training of the Criminal Justice Services Board shall be the approval authority for the training objectives, criteria and lesson plan guides that support the performance outcomes. Training objectives, criteria and lesson plan guides supporting the compulsory minimum training standards and performance outcomes may be added, deleted or amended by the Committee on Training based upon written recommendation of a chief of police, sheriff, agency administrator, academy director, nonlaw-enforcement head of a communications center, or the Curriculum Review Committee.

Prior to approving changes to training objectives, criteria or lesson plan guides, the Committee on Training shall conduct a public hearing. Sixty days prior to the public hearing, the

proposed changes shall be distributed to all affected parties for the opportunity to comment. Notice of change of training objectives, criteria and lesson plan guides shall be filed for publication in the Virginia Register of Regulations upon adoption, change or deletion. The department shall notify each certified academy in writing of any new, revised, or deleted objectives. Such adoptions, changes or deletions shall become effective 30 days after notice of publication in the Virginia Register.

6 VAC 20-60-30. Applicability.

A. All dispatchers employed by or in any local or state government agency whose duties include the dispatching of law-enforcement personnel and who ~~was~~ were hired on or after July 1, 1988, must meet compulsory minimum training standards established *at the time of their appointment*, unless provided otherwise in accordance with subsection B in this chapter.

B. The director may grant an exemption or partial exemption of the compulsory minimum training standards established herein, in accordance with § ~~9-473~~ 9.1-116 of the Code of Virginia.

6 VAC 20-60-40. Time requirement for completion of training.

A. Every dispatcher who is required to comply with the compulsory minimum training standards must satisfactorily complete the required training set forth in 6 VAC 20-60-20, within 12 months of the date of appointment as a dispatcher, unless provided otherwise in accordance with subsection B of *this section*.

B. The director may grant an extension of the time limit for completion of the compulsory minimum training standards under the following conditions:

1. The chief of police, sheriff, or agency administrator shall present written notification that the dispatcher was unable to complete the required training within the specified time limit due to:

a. Illness;

b. Injury;

c. Military service;

d. Special duty assignment required and performed in the public interest;

e. Administrative leave involving the determination of worker's compensation or disability retirement issues, or suspension pending investigation or adjudication of a crime; or

f. Any other reason documented by the agency administrator. Such reason must be specific and any approval granted shall not exceed 90 days.

2. Any extension granted under subdivision 1 e of this subsection shall require the dispatcher to complete compulsory minimum training prior to resuming job duties. Requests may be granted for periods not to exceed 12 months.

Proposed Regulations

3. The agency administrator must request such extension prior to expiration of any time limit.

C. Any dispatcher having previously and successfully completed the compulsory minimum training standards who resigns and is reappointed within 12 months from departure will not be required to complete the academy training class.

6 VAC 20-60-50. How Compliance with compulsory minimum training standards may be attained.

~~A. The compulsory minimum training standards shall be attained by attending and satisfactorily completing the required dispatcher training accomplished by satisfactory completion of the academy training objectives at a certified training academy and the successful completion of on-the-job training as applicable objectives as provided by 6 VAC 20-60-30 B.~~

B. Dispatchers attending compulsory minimum training at a certified training academy are required to attend all classes and should not be placed on duty or call except in cases of emergency.

C. The Criminal Justice Services Board will provide a transition period for implementation of this chapter. The transition period shall begin January 1, 2002. During the transition period, certified training academies may conduct dispatcher entry-level training using the performance objectives within the "Rules Relating to Compulsory Minimum Training Standards for Dispatchers," effective January 1, 1994, or the performance outcomes and training objectives. Accordingly, any certified training academy may institute a curriculum transition by replacing existing performance objectives with the revised performance outcomes and training objectives. Effective July 1, 2002, all entry-level training programs shall meet the requirements of 6 VAC 20-60-100.

6 VAC 20-60-60. Approved training schools.

A. Dispatcher classroom training may only be provided by a certified training academy. The certified training academy shall submit to the department the curriculum and other information as designated, within time limitations established by the department.

B. Each academy director will be required to maintain a file of all current lesson plans and supporting materials for each subject contained in the compulsory minimum training standards.

C. A certified training academy is subject to inspection and review by the director or staff.

~~D. The department may suspend the certification of a certified training academy upon written notice, which shall contain the reason(s) upon which the suspension is based, to the school's director. The academy's director may request a hearing before the director or his designee. The request shall be in writing and must be received by the department within 15 days of the date of notice of suspension. The academy's director may appeal the director or designee's decision to the board.~~

~~E. The department may revoke the certification of any certified training academy upon written notice which shall contain the reason(s) upon which the revocation is based to the school's director. The academy's director may request a hearing before the director or his designee. The request shall be in writing and must be received by the department within 15 days of the date of the notice of revocation. The academy's director may appeal the director or designee's decision to the board.~~

D. To become a certified academy, a state or local unit of government must demonstrate a need that contains the following elements:

1. The inability to obtain adequate training from existing academies or a sufficient hardship that renders the use of other existing academies impractical.

2. Based upon a training needs assessment, a sufficient number of officers to warrant the establishment of a full-time training function for a minimum of five years.

E. In addition, the state or local unit of government must make the following commitments:

1. The provision of a full range of training to include entry-level training and specialized training.

2. The assignment of one position with primary responsibility as academy director and one clerical position to support training and training related functions and instructor certification.

3. The maintenance of a training facility adequate to conduct training in accordance with academy certification standards.

4. The commitment of sufficient funding to adequately support the training function.

F. Process.

1. The state or local governmental unit shall submit a justification to the Committee on Training as described in subsection B of this section. The Committee on Training shall review the justification and make a recommendation to the department as to whether the establishment of an academy is warranted.

2. If the Committee on Training recommends the establishment of the proposed academy, the department shall make a determination as to whether the establishment of the academy is warranted.

3. If the establishment of the academy is approved by the department, the proposed academy must successfully complete the academy certification process.

G. The certified training academy shall submit to the department its curriculum and other information as designated within time limitations established by the department.

H. Each academy director shall maintain a file of all current lesson plans and supporting material for training objectives, and shall provide this information to the director upon request.

I. A certified training academy is subject to inspection and review by the director or his staff.

J. The department may suspend or revoke the certification of any certified training academy upon written notice, which shall contain the reason or reasons upon which the suspension or revocation is based, to the academy's director. The academy's director may request a hearing before the director. The request shall be in writing and shall be received by the department within 15 days of the date of the notice of the suspension or revocation. The academy's director may appeal the director's decision to the board.

6 VAC 20-60-70. Grading.

~~A. Each certified training academy shall test each student in accordance with the objectives in the document entitled "Performance Based Training and Testing Objectives for Compulsory Minimum Training Standards for Dispatchers." Any certified training academy providing training in accordance with subdivision 1 g (4) of 6 VAC 20-60-20 shall be required to develop performance based training and testing objectives and test for any optional job related subjects selected.~~

A. All certified training academies shall utilize testing procedures that indicate that every dispatcher has satisfactorily completed the criteria in each training objective approved by the Committee on Training of the Criminal Justice Services Board. A dispatcher may be tested and retested as may be necessary within the time limits of 6 VAC 20-60-40 and in accordance with each academy's written policy.

B. Certified training academies shall maintain accurate records of all tests, grades and testing procedures. Academy training records must be maintained in accordance with the provisions of this chapter and §§ 42.1-76 through 42.1-91 of the Code of Virginia.

~~B.~~ C. Every individual attending compulsory minimum training shall satisfactorily complete each required performance outcome, training objective, and criteria, and any optional job related subject performance objective requirements, where applicable. Any individual who fails to satisfactorily complete any performance objective outcomes or objectives in any subject will be required to attend that subject in a subsequent approved dispatcher training school and satisfactorily complete the required performance objective or objectives.

6 VAC 20-60-80. Failure to comply with rules and regulations.

~~Individuals~~ Any individual attending a certified training academy shall comply with the rules and regulations promulgated by the department and any other rules and regulations within the authority of the academy director. The academy director shall be responsible for enforcement of all rules and regulations established to govern the conduct of attendees. If the academy director considers a violation of the rules and regulations detrimental to the welfare of the academy, the academy director may expel the individual from the certified training academy. Notification of such action shall immediately be reported, in writing, to the agency administrator of the dispatcher and the director.

6 VAC 20-60-90. Administrative requirements.

A. Reports will be required from the agency administrator and academy director on forms approved or provided by the department and at such times as designated by the director.

B. The agency administrator shall, within the time requirement set forth in subsection A of 6 VAC 20-60-40, forward a properly executed on-the-job training form to the department for each dispatcher.

C. The academy director shall, within 30 days upon completion of the dispatcher training:

1. Submit to the department a roster containing the names of those individuals dispatchers who have satisfactorily completed all classroom the compulsory minimum training requirements standards.

2. Submit to the department the final curriculum with the training objectives and instructor names listed.

D. The academy director shall furnish each instructor with the performance based training and testing objectives for the assigned subject matter.

E. Each certified training academy shall maintain accurate records of all tests, grades and testing procedures. Dispatcher training records shall be maintained in accordance with the provisions of these regulations and §§ 42.1-67 through 42.1-91 of the Code of Virginia.

6 VAC 20-60-100. Performance outcomes for compulsory minimum training standards for dispatchers.

Category 1 – Communication

In conjunction with responding to calls for public safety services, the dispatcher faces challenges every day that require knowledge, judgment, skill, and ability from multiple and varied sources. To meet these challenges successfully, the dispatcher must develop good communication skills in the performance of relevant duties. Expected performance outcomes in this category include the following:

1.1 Obtain information related to complaints and/or requests for service from the public, field units, and other agencies.

1.2 Perform multiple tasks related to receiving information and dispatching appropriate response units.

1.3 Apply standard communication techniques in receiving and transmitting information via radio and telephone.

1.4 Disseminate information to the public, field units, and other agencies.

1.5 Apply standard communication techniques when handling specialized situations via radio, telephone, and in person.

1.6 Complete departmental forms and reports as required.

1.7 Assist callers by providing initial emergency medical care to victims of accidents, illness and/or crimes, if applicable.

1.8 Respond to disasters.

Proposed Regulations

1.9 Inform callers regarding actions to take in hazardous situations.

Category 2 – Judgment

In conjunction with responding to calls for public safety services, the dispatcher faces challenges every day that require knowledge, judgment, skill, and ability from multiple and varied sources. To meet these challenges successfully, the dispatcher must develop good judgment in the performance of relevant duties. Expected performance outcomes in this category include the following:

2.1 Receive, prioritize, and handle multiple tasks related to emergency call taking and dispatching using judgment based on policies and procedures.

2.2 Receive and handle various types of nonemergency complaints and requests from the public or other agencies by using judgment based on policies and procedures.

Category 3 – Equipment Use

In conjunction with responding to calls for public safety services, the dispatcher faces challenges every day that require knowledge, judgment, skill, and ability from multiple and varied sources. To meet these challenges successfully, the dispatcher must develop skills in the use of technical equipment required for performance of relevant duties. Expected performance outcomes in this category include the following:

3.1 Use computer-aided dispatch (CAD) equipment to enter complaint information, if applicable.

3.2 Use written information or computer-aided dispatch (CAD) equipment to dispatch response units.

3.3 Use telephone, radio, and computer equipment to handle specialized communication functions.

3.4 Use computer-aided dispatch (CAD) equipment for reporting functions, if applicable.

3.5 Use radio to process an emergency incident.

3.6 Use VCIN/NCIC after certification.

3.7 Receive and process alerts provided by alarm/security systems panel.

3.8 Maintain equipment within the communications center.

Category 4 – Legal Issues

In conjunction with responding to calls for public safety services, the dispatcher must identify legal requirements based on the Constitution of the United States, the Code of Virginia, and/or local ordinances where applicable. Expected performance outcomes in this category include the following:

4.1 Apply federal/state laws, local ordinances, and rules and regulations established for dispatch operations.

4.2 Perform the duties of a dispatcher with awareness of general liability applicable to this job.

4.3 Testify in court.

4.4 Manage dispatch operations records.

Category 5 -- Professionalism

In conjunction with responding to calls for public safety services, the dispatcher must demonstrate professionalism in every aspect of performance of these services. The dispatcher faces challenges every day that require knowledge, judgment, skill, and ability from multiple and varied sources. To meet those challenges successfully, the dispatcher must attain and maintain professionalism in the performance of all duties. Expected performance outcomes include the following:

5.1 Respond to stressful situations professionally.

5.2 Respond to abusive callers or difficult people professionally.

Category 6 – General Assistance

In conjunction with responding to calls for service, the dispatcher must identify requirements related to the employing law-enforcement agency or local governmental agency. These requirements may be general in nature, but serve to enhance the ability of both the dispatcher and the agency to provide needed public safety services. Expected performance outcomes in this category include the following:

6.1 Provide general assistance to employers, the public, and other agencies through maintenance or use of required resource materials.

Title of Regulation: **22 VAC 40-41-10 et seq. Neighborhood Assistance Tax Credit Program (amending 22 VAC 40-41-10, 22 VAC 40-41-20, 22 VAC 40-41-40, and 22 VAC 40-41-50; adding 22 VAC 40-41-55).**

Statutory Authority: § 63.1-323 of the Code of Virginia.

Basis: Section 63.1-323 of the Code of Virginia authorizes the State Board of Social Services to promulgate regulations for the approval and disapproval of proposals by organizations who seek to be included as Neighborhood Assistance Program (NAP) projects, and also for determining the value of donations to those organizations. Legislation that passed the 2001 General Assembly requires regulations covering donations by individuals to NAP projects.

Purpose: These amendments add new sections describing the process for individuals to receive tax credits for cash donations to projects and the value of those tax credits. They also reflect language that allows contracting services to be donated and describes the valuing of those donations. There are also a couple of "housekeeping" type changes to existing language to correct grammar or make the intent clearer. These amendments are necessary both to meet the statutory requirements that regulations be promulgated for the program, and to provide the public with as much information as possible on all rules and requirements for participants in the program.

The Neighborhood Assistance Program has been changed by legislation every year for at least the past four years. This makes it difficult to keep the regulations current. The goal in preparing regulations for this program is to provide as much helpful detail as possible, but still allow for the annual changes. This is accomplished by references to sections of the Code of Virginia that change frequently. For example, rather than put into the regulations the current minimum cash donation by an individual, reference is made to the minimum stated in § 63.1-325.2 of the Code of Virginia. It is anticipated that the amount specified in the Code of Virginia will change again before these regulations make it through the regulatory process. This requires individuals to look at both the regulation and the Code of Virginia, but it eliminates the confusion that could be caused by a conflict between the two.

The amendments are necessary to ensure that the public has access to current, clear information that will help them make use of this program. Taking advantage of tax credit programs directly impacts a family's welfare in that it affects the amount of taxes they must pay to the state and therefore impacts their disposable income.

Substance: The amendments add "contracting services" as services that are allowable as a donation eligible for tax credits. Prior to this change, the only services that were allowed were those listed in the procurement title of the Code of Virginia.

Language was added in several locations to clarify that individuals can now make cash donations to NAP programs in exchange for tax credits.

The list of health professionals who can receive tax credits for donations of their professional services was increased. Nurse practitioners, physician's assistants, optometrists, dental hygienists, and pharmacists were added. These health professionals can use the tax credits they receive for donating their professional services on their individual tax returns. Their donation must be made to a clinic that is an approved NAP project.

Issues: This regulation makes additional information, beyond that in the Code of Virginia, available to the public to help them understand how the Neighborhood Assistance Program operates. The regulation is part of the package that is used in workshops on the program offered around the state.

These amendments are the result of changes to the program made during the General Assembly. The amendments explain the types of services that contractors can provide and receive tax credits for those donations. They also make it clear that

individuals can receive a tax credit for their cash donations to NAP projects. In addition, the amendment expands the list of health professionals who can donate their professional services to approved NAP projects and receive tax credits.

The only disadvantage to the public is that the regulations must be as general as possible to prevent their being outdated before the regulatory process is completed. The Neighborhood Assistance Program has been changed by the legislature every year for at least the past four years.

Department of Planning and Budget's Economic Impact Analysis: The Department of Planning and Budget (DPB) has analyzed the economic impact of this proposed regulation in accordance with § 9-6.14:7.1 G of the Administrative Process Act and Executive Order Number 25 (98). Section 9-6.14:7.1 G requires that such economic impact analyses include, but need not be limited to, the projected number of businesses or other entities to whom the regulation would apply, the identity of any localities and types of businesses or other entities particularly affected, the projected number of persons and employment positions to be affected, the projected costs to affected businesses or entities to implement or comply with the regulation, and the impact on the use and value of private property. The analysis presented below represents DPB's best estimate of these economic impacts.

Summary of the proposed regulation. The proposed amendments to the Neighborhood Assistance Tax Credit Program reflect changes in the controlling statute that now allow individuals, additional health professionals, and businesses offering contracting services to receive tax credits for their donations.

Estimated economic impact. The Neighborhood Assistance Program provides tax credits as an incentive to encourage donations to qualified nonprofit organizations for the benefit of impoverished people. The amount of tax credits available is established by the General Assembly and has been set at \$8 million for the past several years.

Prior to 2000, only businesses, physicians, and dentists could receive tax credits for donations made to approved Neighborhood Assistance Program (NAP) projects. The only services that could be donated were those listed in the procurement section of the Code of Virginia. Changes made in recent General Assembly sessions added "contracting services" as services that are allowable as a donation eligible for tax credits, specified that individuals can now make cash donations to neighborhood assistance programs in exchange for tax credits, and expanded the list of health care professionals who can receive tax credits for donations of their professions services to include nurse practitioners, physician's assistants, optometrists, dental hygienists, and pharmacists.

Broadening the base of allowable donors is likely to increase the amount of donations made to NAP projects only if the maximum level of tax credits available is not currently being exceeded. According to the Department of Social Services, in the 1999 program year, only \$7 million of the \$8 million in tax credits available was allocated out to projects. During the 2000 program year, when individuals were first allowed to make donations, all \$8 million available was allocated out to

projects. The maximum amount of tax credits available to be claimed by individuals is \$1 million.¹ Therefore, increases in individual donors are not expected to replace existing business donors. According to the department, the programs that received new donations from individuals were those that marketed the new tax credit well.

In summary, the proposed changes to this regulation reflect current practices allowed by law and ensure that the public has access to current clear information that will help them make use of this program. One possible disadvantage is that the new changes increase the complexity of the tax credit program and may make the program more difficult to administer and comply with, especially for smaller nonprofit organizations.

Businesses and entities affected. There are currently 234 approved Neighborhood Assistance Programs. The Department of Social Services estimates that over 4,500 individuals and businesses donated to those projects last year.

Localities particularly affected. The proposed changes to this regulation will not uniquely affect any particular localities.

Projected impact on employment. The proposed changes to this regulation are not expected to have any impact on employment in Virginia.

Effects on the use and value of private property. The proposed changes to this regulation are not expected to have any significant effects on the use and value of private property.

Agency's Response to the Department of Planning and Budget's Economic Impact Analysis: The Department of Social Services concurs with the economic impact analysis prepared by the Department of Planning and Budget.

Summary:

The Neighborhood Assistance Program (NAP) regulations describe how nonprofit organizations can qualify to become NAP projects. The regulations also describe how tax credits are allocated among the NAP projects and how donations are valued.

The proposed amendments reflect changes in the controlling statute that allow individuals, additional health professionals, and businesses offering contracting services to receive tax credits for their donations.

22 VAC 40-41-10. Definitions.

The following words and terms when used in this chapter shall have the following meanings unless the context clearly indicates otherwise:

"*Audit*" means any audit required under the federal Office of Management and Budget's Circular A-133, or, if a neighborhood organization is not required to file an audit

under Circular A-133, a detailed financial statement prepared by a certified public accountant.

"*Business firm*" means any corporation, partnership, electing small business (Subchapter S) corporation, limited liability company, or sole proprietorship authorized to do business in this Commonwealth subject to tax imposed by Articles 2 (§ 58.1-320 et seq.) and 10 (§ 58.1-400 et seq.) of Chapter 3, Chapter 12 (§ 58.1-1200 et seq.), Article 1 (§ 58.1-2500 et seq.) of Chapter 25, or Article 2 (§ 58.1-2620 et seq.) of Chapter 26 of Title 58.1 of the Code of Virginia.

"*Community services*" means any type of counseling and advice, emergency assistance, medical care, provision of basic necessities, or services designed to minimize the effects of poverty, furnished primarily to impoverished people.

"*Contracting services*" means the provision, by a business firm licensed by the Commonwealth of Virginia as a contractor under Chapter 11 (§ 54.1-1100 et seq.) of Title 54.1 of the Code of Virginia, of labor or technical advice to aid in the development, construction, renovation, or repair of (i) homes of impoverished people or (ii) buildings used by neighborhood organizations.

"*Education*" means any type of scholastic instruction or scholarship assistance to an individual who is impoverished.

"*Housing assistance*" means furnishing financial assistance, labor, material, or technical advice to aid the physical improvement of the homes of impoverished people.

"*Impoverished people*" means people in Virginia with incomes at or below 150% of the poverty guidelines as defined by the United States Office of Management and Budget as published in the Federal Register (62 FR 10856), and as updated and republished annually in the Federal Register.

"*Job training*" means any type of instruction to an individual who is impoverished that enables him to acquire vocational skills so that he can become employable or able to seek a higher grade of employment.

"*Neighborhood assistance*" means providing community services, education, housing assistance, or job training.

"*Neighborhood organization*" means any local, regional or statewide organization whose primary function is providing neighborhood assistance for impoverished people, and holding a ruling from the Internal Revenue Service of the United States Department of the Treasury that the organization is exempt from income taxation under the provisions of §§ 501(c)(3) and or § 501(c)(4) of the Internal Revenue Code of 1986, as amended from time to time, or any organization defined as a community action agency in the Economic Opportunity Act of 1964 (42 USC § 2701 et seq.), or any housing authority as defined in § 36-3 of the Code of Virginia.

"*Professional services*" means any type of personal service to the public which requires as a condition precedent to the rendering of such service the obtaining of a license or other legal authorization and shall include, but shall not be limited to, the personal services rendered by medical doctors, dentists, architects, professional engineers, certified public accountants and attorneys-at-law.

¹ The minimum and maximum donation amounts for each individual are currently \$50 to \$200. This amount is increasing to a minimum donation of \$900 and a maximum donation of \$1,667 in 2002.

22 VAC 40-41-20. Purpose; procedure for becoming neighborhood assistance project; termination of project status; appeal procedure.

A. The purpose of the Neighborhood Assistance Program is to encourage business firms *and individuals* to make donations to neighborhood organizations for the benefit of impoverished people.

B. Neighborhood organizations wishing to become an approved neighborhood assistance project must submit a proposal to the Commissioner of Social Services or his designee. This proposal must be on the form prescribed by the commissioner or his designee and at a minimum contain:

1. A description of their eligibility as a neighborhood organization, the program to be conducted, the impoverished people to be assisted, the estimated amount that will be donated to the program, and plans for implementing the program.
2. Proof of the neighborhood organization's current exemption from income taxation under the provisions of § 501(c)(3) or § 501(c)(4) of the Internal Revenue Code, or the organization's eligibility as a community action agency as defined in the Economic Opportunity Act of 1964 (42 USC § 2701 et seq.) or housing authority as defined in § 36-3 of the Code of Virginia.
3. A copy of the neighborhood organization's most recent audit, a copy of the organization's most current federal form 990, and a copy of the annual report filed with the Department of Agriculture and Consumer Services' Division of Consumer Protection.
4. A statement of objective and measurable outcomes that are expected to occur and the method the organization will use to evaluate the program's effectiveness.

C. The application period for neighborhood organizations to become approved neighborhood assistance projects will start no later than March 1 of each year. All applications must be received by the Department of Social Services no later than the first working day of May.

D. Those organizations submitting all required information and reports, meeting the eligibility criteria of a neighborhood organization, and whose proposals are consistent with the Neighborhood Assistance Act (§ 63.1-320 et seq. of the Code of Virginia), will be determined an eligible project for the Neighborhood Assistance Program. The ~~approval period~~ *program year* will run from July 1 through June 30 of the following year.

E. The commissioner or his designee may terminate a project's eligibility based on a finding of program abuse involving illegal activities or fraudulent reporting on contributions.

F. Any neighborhood organization that disagrees with the disposition of their applications, or their termination as an eligible project, may appeal to the commissioner for a reconsideration. Such requests must be made within 30 days of the denial or termination. The commissioner will act on the request and render a final decision within 30 days of the request for reconsideration.

22 VAC 40-41-40. Value of donations.

A. The approved neighborhood organization is responsible for maintaining documentation acceptable to the Department of Social Services and establishing the date and value of all donations.

B. The value of donations of cash, including stocks, bonds, or other negotiable items, merchandise, and real estate is the value determined for federal tax purposes using IRS regulations (26 CFR 1 et seq., and as amended).

C. The value assigned for donated rent/lease of property must be reasonable and cannot exceed the prevailing square footage rental charge for comparable property.

D. The value of professional *and contracting* services is determined as follows:

1. When ~~an employer~~ *a business* donates professional *or contracting* services provided by employees, the value of the donation shall be equal to the salary that such employee was actually paid for the period of time that such employee rendered professional *or contracting* services to the approved program. Operating overhead and benefit costs are not included in determining the contribution.
2. When a sole proprietor ~~or~~, partner in a partnership, *or member of a limited liability company* renders professional *or contracting* services to a program, the value of the professional *or contracting* services shall not exceed the lesser of the reasonable cost for similar services from other providers or the maximum amount set forth in §§ 63.1-325 and 63.1-325.1 of the Code of Virginia.
3. When a physician ~~or~~, dentist, *nurse practitioner, physician's assistant, optometrist, dental hygienist, or pharmacist* licensed pursuant to Title 54.1 of the Code of Virginia provides health care services, the value of such services shall not exceed the lesser of the reasonable cost for similar services from other providers or the maximum amount set forth in § 63.1-325 of the Code of Virginia.

22 VAC 40-41-50. Donations by businesses, ~~physicians,~~ and dentists health care professionals.

A. As provided by § 63.1-324 of the Code of Virginia, a business firm shall be eligible for a tax credit based on the value of the money, property, and professional services donated by the business firm during its taxable year to an approved neighborhood organization.

B. No tax credit shall be granted to any business firm for donations to a neighborhood organization providing job training or education for individuals employed by the business firm.

C. Physicians ~~and~~, dentists, *nurse practitioners, physician's assistants, optometrists, dental hygienists, and pharmacists* licensed pursuant to Title 54.1 of the Code of Virginia who provide health care services without charge at a clinic which is an approved neighborhood organization, and is organized in whole or in part for the delivery of health care services without charge, shall be eligible for a tax credit based on the time spent in providing health care services at such clinic.

D. All donations must be made without any conditions or expectation of monetary benefit from the project. ~~Discounting of Discounted~~ property or professional services is not an allowable donation for the Neighborhood Assistance Program.

E. Granting of tax credits shall conform to the minimum and maximum amounts prescribed in § 63.1-324 of the Code of Virginia.

F. Credits granted to a partnership, electing small business (Subchapter S) corporation, or limited liability company shall be allocated to their individual partners, shareholders, or members, respectively, in proportion to their ownership or interest in such business entities.

G. ~~The business firm and Neighborhood Assistance Program project and its donor~~ shall complete a certification on a form prescribed by the Department of Social Services and submit it to the commissioner or his designee. The certification shall identify the date, type and value of the donation ~~and the business firm making the donation.~~

H. All certifications must be submitted to the commissioner or his designee within four years of the date of donation.

I. Upon receipt and approval of the certification, the commissioner or his designee shall issue a tax credit certificate to the business.

22 VAC 40-41-55. Donations by individuals.

A. *As provided in § 63.1-325.2 of the Code of Virginia, an individual shall be eligible for a tax credit for a cash donation to a Neighborhood Assistance project.*

B. *Such donations are subject to the minimum and maximum amounts and other provisions set forth in § 63.1-325.2 of the Code of Virginia.*

C. *The Neighborhood Assistance project and the individual shall complete a certification on a form prescribed by the Department of Social Services and submit it to the commissioner or his designee. The certification shall identify the date and amount of the donation.*

D. *Upon receipt and approval of the certification, the commissioner or his designee shall issue a tax credit certificate to the individual.*

The amendments establish requirements for the recreational use of eel pots.

4 VAC 20-670-20. Recreational gear licenses.

A. Any person desiring to take or catch finfish or shellfish for recreational purposes in the tidal waters of Virginia using commercial gear authorized under § 28.2-226.1 of the Code of Virginia shall first pay the specified fee and obtain the license for the appropriate gear, as follows:

1. Recreational gill net	\$7.50
2. Recreational fish cast net	\$8.00
3. Recreational fish dip net	\$6.00
4. Recreational crab pot	\$29.00
5. Recreational crab trap	\$5.00
6. Recreational ordinary crab trot line	\$8.00
7. <i>Recreational eel pot</i>	<i>\$10.00</i>

B. Any license to use fishing gear for recreational purposes shall be issued to an individual for his exclusive use and shall not be transferable.

C. No person shall be issued more than one recreational gill net license, more than one recreational crab pot license, ~~nor~~ more than one crab trap license, *nor more than one recreational eel pot license.*

D. No license shall be required of any person taking minnows, menhaden, or mullet with a cast net for personal use as bait which is not to be sold, traded, or bartered.

4 VAC 20-670-30. Gear restrictions.

A. It shall be unlawful for any person to use any gill net greater than 300 feet in length when licensed for recreational purposes under this chapter. Any person licensed to use a recreational gill net shall stay within 100 yards of such net when it is overboard. Failure to attend such net in this fashion is a violation of this chapter.

B. It shall be unlawful for any person to use more than five crab pots *or more than two eel pots* when licensed for recreational purposes under this chapter.

C. Any law or chapter applying to the setting or fishing of commercial gill nets, cast nets, dip nets, crab pots, crab traps, or crab trot lines shall also apply to these gear when set or fished for recreational purposes, except that certain commercial gear used for recreational purposes shall be marked in accordance with the provisions described in 4 VAC 20-670-40.

D. It shall be unlawful for any person to use any recreational gill net, fish cast net, or fish dip net to catch and possess any species of fish whose commercial fishery is regulated by an annual harvest quota.

E. It shall be unlawful for any person using a recreational gill net, fish cast net, or fish dip net to take and possess more than the recreational possession limit for any species regulated by such a limit. When fishing from any boat, using gear licensed under this chapter, the total possession limit shall be equal to the number of persons on board legally eligible to fish multiplied by the individual possession limit for the regulated species, and the captain or operator of the boat shall be responsible for adherence to the possession limit.

F. It shall be unlawful for any person using a recreational gill net, fish cast net, or fish dip net to take and possess any fish which is less than the lawful minimum size established for that species. When the taking of any fish is regulated by different size limits for commercial and recreational fishermen, that size limit applicable to recreational fishermen or to hook-and-line fishermen shall apply to the taking of that species by persons licensed under this chapter.

G. It shall be unlawful for any person licensed to use five crab pots under this chapter to fish these crab pots on Sunday.

H. It shall be unlawful for any person to use any ordinary crab trot line greater than 300 feet in length when licensed for recreational purposes under this chapter.

4 VAC 20-670-40. Gear marking requirements.

A. Buoys of any crab pot, *eel pot*, gill net or ordinary crab trot line used for recreational purposes shall be marked with the

licensee's last four numbers of his social security number or driver's license number, preceded by the letter "R."

B. An offshore stake of any crab trap used for recreational purposes shall be marked with the licensee's last four numbers of his social security number or driver's license number, preceded by the letter "R."

C. In accordance with subsections A and B of this section, licensees shall mark their gear in a legible and visible manner and in figures of not less than one inch in height.

Title of Regulation: 22 VAC 20-30-10 et seq. **Regulations Governing Interpreter Services for the Deaf and Hard of Hearing (amending 22 VAC 20-30-10 through 22 VAC 20-30-60 and 22 VAC 20-30-80 through 22 VAC 20-30-140; adding 22 VAC 20-30-150; repealing 22 VAC 20-30-70).**

The Virginia Department for the Deaf and Hard of Hearing has suspended the regulatory process on the Regulations Governing Interpreter Services for the Deaf and Hard of Hearing (22 VAC 20-30-10 et seq.), which was published in the Virginia Register on July 30, 2001 (17:23 VA.R. 3466-3471). Therefore, the October 1, 2001, effective date will be delayed to allow the department to solicit additional public comments. This action is in response to public comment received during the final comment period. Issues of concern during the final comment period included the grievance procedure; the change from Level 1 to Novice Interpreter designation for Virginia Quality Assurance Screening candidates; the separation of the performance assessment into two distinct assessments with separate registration; and the determination of levels based on the lowest performance assessment segment score.

Additional comments will be received until October 24, 2001. The agency welcomes any additional public comment on this regulation but would especially appreciate specific comments on the issues identified during the final public comment period.

2002 Water Quality Assessment Guidance Manual-- Notice of Public Comment

The Department of Environmental Quality (DEQ) is seeking written comments from interested persons on the 2002 Water Quality Assessment Guidance Manual that contains the assessment procedures used for the development of Virginia's § 305(b) Water Quality Report and § 303(d) List of Impaired Waters, scheduled to be submitted to EPA on April 1, 2002.

Section 62.1-44.19:7 C of the Code of Virginia requires DEQ to develop and publish the procedures used for defining and determining impaired waters and provide for public comment on the procedures.

On August 9, 2001, US EPA published a notice of proposed rulemaking in the Federal Register (Volume 66, Number 154, Page 41817-41822). Part of the proposed rulemaking is revision of the date for state submission of the 2002 List of Impaired Waters. EPA is proposing to revise the date on which states are required to submit the next list of impaired waters from April 1, 2002 to October 1, 2002. The delay is intended to provide time for EPA to issue guidance incorporating some of the National Academy of Science's (NAS) recommendations regarding the methodology used to develop the list and the content of the list.

The DEQ supports the EPA's intent to incorporate some of the NAS recommendations regarding the methodology used to develop the § 303(d) List into its guidance for assessment of water quality. However, EPA is not proposing to delay the required submittal date of the 2002 § 305(b) Water Quality Assessment Report, April 1, 2002, since that submittal date is required by the Clean Water Act. Because of this, DEQ believes it is too late in the assessment cycle to adequately develop and apply revised EPA guidance to the 2002 water quality assessment without resulting in inconsistent and incomparable reports developed under §§ 305(b) and 303(d). To avoid this, DEQ is recommending in its comments on the proposed rulemaking that EPA's guidance currently under development be applied to the assessment cycle culminating in preparation of the 2004 § 305(b) Water Quality Assessment Report and 2004 § 303(d) List of Impaired Waters.

It is possible that EPA will issue revised guidance for development of the 2002 § 305(b) Water Quality Assessment Report and § 303(d) List of Impaired Waters. EPA's revised guidance may result in significant changes to Virginia's 2002 Water Quality Assessment Guidance Manual. Any future changes to the manual will be noticed for public comment.

The public comment period will end at 5 p.m. on Friday, October 26, 2001. Copies of the draft Water Quality Assessment Manual can be requested from Harry Augustine at the address listed below. Notice of Request for Certificate of Public Need Applications for Development of Additional Nursing Home Beds

Legal Notice of Request for Certificate of Public Need Applications. Pursuant to the requirements of § 32.1-102.3:2 of the Code of Virginia, notice is hereby given of consideration of the need to issue a proposed Request for Applications (RFA) for the development of additional nursing home beds. This notice reviews the qualification of Virginia's 22 planning districts for the authorization of additional nursing home beds pursuant to applicable law and regulation (12 VAC 5-360).

Evaluation of Need for Additional Nursing Home Beds. The Nursing Home Services component of the Virginia State Medical Facilities Plan (SMFP) (12 VAC 5-360) contains a nursing home bed need forecasting method (12 VAC 5-360-40 C). This method has been employed by the Virginia Department of Health to compute a forecast of needed nursing home beds in 2004 in each of 22 planning districts.¹

Consistent with the Virginia State Medical Facilities Plan (12 VAC 5-360-40 A), no planning district is considered to have a need for additional nursing home beds unless the estimated average annual occupancy of all existing nonfederal, Medicaid-certified nursing home beds in the planning district was at least 95% for the most recent three years for which bed utilization has been reported to the Virginia Department of Health (through nursing home filings with Virginia Health Information, Inc.).²

For purposes of this document, reporting years 1997 through 1999 are considered to be the most recent three years. The estimated average annual occupancy rates of some planning districts were adjusted to take into account certain regulatory sanctions (i.e., denial of payment for new admissions) that could have affected the ability of some nursing homes to admit Medicare and/or Medicaid patients for varying periods of time during 1997 through 1999.

Also, no planning district will be considered to have a need for additional nursing home beds if there are uncompleted

¹ For conduct of the certificate of public need program, the Virginia Department of Health continues to recognize the former Planning District 20, Southeastern Virginia, and the former Planning District 21, Peninsula, rather than the new combined Planning District 23, Hampton Roads.

² The inventory and utilization of the Virginia Veterans Care Center are excluded, by regulation, from consideration in the determination of nursing home bed need.

nursing home beds authorized for the planning district that will be Medicaid-certified beds. The following table displays, by planning district, the nursing home gross bed need forecast for 2004, the current licensed bed inventory and authorized additions of nursing home beds, and the net bed need forecast for 2004.

The table also shows the estimated average annual occupancy rate of Medicaid-certified nursing home beds for each planning district for the reporting years 1997 through 1999, adjusted for regulatory sanctions in some cases, and identifies the status of each planning district with respect to authorized but uncompleted nursing home beds. The final column of the table states whether the planning district qualifies for additional nursing home beds for 2004.

- 2) Having an estimated average annual occupancy rate of Medicaid-certified beds over the last three years of 95% or higher; and
- 3) Having no authorized but uncompleted nursing home beds that will be Medicaid-certified.

Caroline County Regional Wastewater Treatment
Plant**

The State Water Control Board (board) proposes to issue a Consent Special Order (order) to Caroline County (permittee) regarding the Caroline County Regional Wastewater Treatment Plant (WWTP) located in Caroline County, Virginia.
